Spring 2009 – Request for Program Change: Humanities major (BA/BS)

In the 2008-09 catalog, the Humanities major simply requires 64 credits from at least two humanities fields, with Hum 450 Senior Portfolio a required element. All the other credits are open to be filled by any course under the umbrella of the division. The division voted in 12/08 to initiate the following changes to this procedure:

1. No credits for first-year language can be used in the major, only 2<sup>nd</sup> year and above. (This mirrors the practice in the language majors.)
2. Students should choose courses so there are at least two blocks of courses (two different course prefix groups); each block should contain at least 5 courses, and 4 upper-division courses, with a minimum of 12 upper-division credits. The remaining credits may continue the blocks or may be chosen from other humanities offerings.

The above changes were approved by the Curriculum Committee and subsequently by the Senate. Another change, our desire to limit the double-dipping with LACC courses, was sent back for reworking.

The 64-credit Humanities major is a carryover from the years before LACC double-dipping was approved. Unlike most majors on campus, the Humanities major has the potential of 18 LACC credits to count in the major. We decided that to address the problem of over-heavy emphasis on basic courses, we would like to raise the credits required in the major by 11, to 75 total credits (retaining a minimum of 36 UD credits). (This has an effect similar to limiting LACC double-counting to 7 credits, out of a possible 18.)

With a 64-credit major AND 18 credits from the LACC allowable, that only leaves 46 credits as truly in the major. Add in a possible 12 credits for second-year language (BA), and that is reduced to 34. As mentioned above, the 64 credits was determined at a time when LACC courses were not allowed to double-count. A few years ago, this policy changed; we are simply 'cleaning house' to address a drastic watering-down of the major's integrity.

Hence, the change we desire is simple: from 64 credits to 75 credits, BA or BS.

## Current Catalog (08-09)

Humanities major (64 credits)

Courses in two or more of the following fields: English, French, German, linguistics, Spanish, philosophy and religious studies, communication studies, or writing. The emphasis in the major is determined with the help of an adviser. Possible emphases include communications, modern languages, and philosophy/religion/mythology.

## Revision: Fall/Winter term 2008-09

Humanities major (64 credits)

Courses in two or more of the following areas:

Communication studies, French, German, humanities, Latin, linguistics, literature/English, modern languages, philosophy, religious studies, Spanish, or writing. The courses in the major are determined with the help of an advisor. Possible emphases include communications, modern languages, and philosophy/religion/mythology.

- a. at least five (5) courses total in each of two areas;
- b. at least four (4) of the five courses must be upper-division courses, for a minimum of 12 credits upper-division per block/area;
- c. other Humanities areas may be included in the plan, in addition to the two blocks of courses;
- d. first-year language courses will not count in the major.

Required: 36 upper-division credits, including HUM 450 Senior Portfolio (1)
