How to Apply to Graduate

(Undergraduates and Post-Baccalaureates)

(To be eligible to apply to graduate you must have **completed** at least 135 credits!)


- Review the regulations for <u>Graduation and Commencement</u>.
- Login to the WOU <u>Portal</u> and open Experience:



Select View All Cards:



Select the Student Menu card (or search for "Student Menu"):



- Select the Apply to Graduate option from the menu on the left.
- Follow the prompts all the way through to submission:
 - Note: the first step is not selecting the graduation term that comes later in the process. The first step is selecting the most recent curriculum term.
 If an error message displays reading "No curricula available for graduation

- application", contact <u>graduation@wou.edu</u> (include your V# in your message!)
- Note: applying to graduate and registering for the commencement ceremony are <u>not the same</u>: apply to graduate for the term in which you plan to complete all requirements.
 - Commencement registration invitations are sent to eligible participants during Spring term.
- Completing more than one major? Submit one application. Make sure all majors are listed: do not submit the application if not all majors are listed – contact your advisor.
- Completing multiple degrees or credentials (such as a BA and a BS, or a degree and a certificate)? Submit separate applications, one for each credential. Select the same graduation term for all credentials. Submit applications for degrees first, then certificates.
- There is a submission confirmation screen. On the day following submission, Degree Tracks will display anticipated graduation terms for submitted applications.
- Undergraduate and post-baccalaureate students must submit graduation applications no later than the second Friday of the term in which they plan to graduate, per the <u>Academic Calendar</u>. It is recommended that graduation applications are submitted for the planned graduation term as soon as one becomes eligible to submit (when at least 135 credits are completed).
