

Department in the Spotlight



What does Student Success and Advising (SSA) do?

Student Success and Advising assists students and the campus in a few different ways. They are the primary advisers for pre-nursing majors and for students who are exploring majors, they coordinate tutoring services for general education, (excluding math, science, and writing courses) and skills based tutoring, they assist students in overcoming challenges to achieve academic success, they provide training and support to faculty who serve as advisers, and they connect students with resources. In addition to these responsibilities, SSA collaborates with other areas on campus to let students know what services they provide.

How do students make appointments with Student Success and Advising?

The best way for a student to make an appointment is through the Wolf Connection System (WCS). This allows the student to choose a time and an adviser based on their needs. If the student does not want to use the Wolf Connection System, you can send the student to the Student Success and Advising, located in the Advising Center on Church Street, and they can make an appointment with the student employee at the front desk.

Who works in Student Success and Advising?

Student Success and Advising is made up of a Director, an Assistant Director, three Academic Success Advisors, a Bilingual Academic Success Advisor, a Tutoring Coordinator/Academic Success Advisor, and an Office Coordinator/Academic Advisor as well as four student employees, one grad intern, and 20-25 student tutors. Top 5 things you should know about Student Success and Advising:

- Student Success and Advising wants to help all students with any needs or questions they may have.
 - Since SSA assists students when a professor refers them for help or when they are on academic warning or probation, students think that SSA is only for students that need academic assistance.
 This is far from the truth. <u>SSA helps</u> <u>all students be successful in college.</u>
- 2. Student Success and Advising coordinates the Wolf Connection System.
 - If you need access, training, and/or have questions about the Wolf Connection System, contact the Assistant Director of SSA. Lizzy Harman: harmanl@wou.edu
- The advisers in Student Success and Advising are the advisers for pre-nursing majors and students who are exploring majors.
 - If you are assisting a student that falls into one of these categories, send them to SSA for help.
- 4. Student Success and Advising provides general education and skills based tutoring.
 - General education tutoring does not include writing, science, or mathematics.
 Separate tutoring centers exist for these areas
 - Skills based tutoring includes subjects like test taking and time management.
- 5. Student Success and Advising supports anyone on campus in an advising capacity.
 - The director, Niki Weight, is available to assist advisers on campus.
 - While SSA provides academic advising to pre-nursing and undecided major students, they can help other students.
 However, if a student has a declared major, SSA advisers will refer the student to continue the conversation about their degree with their assigned adviser.



Department in the Spotlight



What does Mail Services do?

Mail Services sorts, delivers, and sends mail for the campus. This may sound like a simple task, however, it can be very challenging. Often times Mail Services employees must employ their detective skills to successfully deliver mail. Clues employees rely on are transparency of envelopes, their ability to recognize handwriting, and/or prior knowledge of department correspondence.

When Mail Services cannot figure out who a piece of mail goes to, they send it to the President's Office. The President's Office is the only office on campus that has the power to open all WOU mail.

Amanda Bales, Mail Services Specialist, says the slogan that best fits Mail Services is "Sort mail and know things".

Who works in the Mail Services?

Mail Services has one full time employee, Amanda Bales, and six student employees. When you have questions or need to speak to someone in Mail Services, Amanda is the best person to contact. However, the student employees are also very knowledgeable and should be able to assist you in most cases.

What's on the horizon for Mail Services?

Mail Services will be moving with the Print Shop to the Oregon Military Academic this summer. Keep your eyes peeled for specifics in the coming months.



Top 5 things you should know about Mail Services:

- 1. Make sure you <u>write your index on the items you intend to mail.</u>
 - Nothing can be mailed until an index is specified by the department.
- 2. Make sure to <u>write clearly or type</u> your mailing information.
 - Mail can be returned if the Post Office cannot read the mailing information.
- 3. When sending campus mail, make sure to designate a department and name.
 - There are several departments that are housed within a building, like the Werner University Center, and several people with the same first name, we have 21 employees who are named Michael, so make sure to be specific.
 Ex: Computing Solutions Michael Ellis
 - or Athletics Michael Feuling.
- 4. Let Mail Services know when they send mail to the wrong department.
 - Mail Services wants to know when they make mistakes, so they can make sure to send mail to the correct place in the future.
- To further WOU's value of sustainability, make sure to <u>send all recyclable packing items</u> to Mail Services.
 - This includes packing peanuts and air bubble sheets.
